MESSAGE FROM SHERIFF HERNANDEZ

My entire career has been spent helping victims in some form or fashion. I truly believe it's my calling to seek justice for people whose lives have been forever changed due to the criminal actions of someone else. Along the journey, I've had the distinct honor of working alongside Ellen Halbert.

In 1986, Ellen was brutally assaulted and left for dead by her attacker. A short time later, still recovering from the devastating physical and emotional damage wrought upon her, Ellen stood on the steps of the Texas State Capitol and shared her experience. She found her voice, and her calling. In 1991, she was appointed by Governor Ann Richards as the first victim to serve on the Texas Board of Criminal Justice. She also served as the Director of Victim Services at the Travis County District Attorney's Office. That's where the two of us had the opportunity to join forces.

I was an investigator for the District Attorney's (DA) Office and as my team poured our efforts into every fine detail of preparing a case for trial, Ellen's voice for the victims assured we never got so caught up in the process that we forgot the purpose. For many years beyond the DA's Office, Ellen and I made annual appearances in local high schools, speaking to students about assault; what it is, how it can happen, and what to do about it.

For me, Ellen was, and always will be, the first person I think of when I think of Victim's Rights, but she's certainly not the only hero who comes to mind. Your Travis County Sheriff's Office is staffed with an exceptional [Victim Services Unit](#). This group of staff and volunteers serve at all hours of the day and night, offering comfort, solid answers and resources to victims and their families.

April 24 - 30 was [National Crime Victims' Rights Week](#). As the events of that week unfolded, I was reminded how grateful I am for victim's advocates. I have deep respect for their voice. As your Sheriff, it is of the utmost importance to me that we put victims first and do everything we can to get justice for them.

SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH



April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month, and TCSO is dedicated to raising awareness about sexual assault and educating our community on how to prevent sexual violence. On April 5th, we joined community partners as the [Travis County Commissioners Court](#) recognized the awareness month with a proclamation. From our first responders to our Criminal Investigations Division and Victim Services Unit, TCSO works diligently to hold criminals accountable for their actions, while providing support to victims.

Additionally, at the [International Conference on Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, and Reimagining Justice](#), TCSO Detective Tim Parrish was awarded the [Megan Rondini Scholarship](#) for his commitment to enhancing his skills in responding competently, and compassionately, to sexual assault victims. VIRTUAL TRAINING SIMULATOR



TCSO recently adopted a new, immersive way to enhance its training capabilities — the [VirTra](#) V-300 scenario-based training system. It uses five video projection panels, each of which are independently capable of displaying dozens of possible situational branches during training scenarios. The building that houses the simulator is designated a "weapons clean" facility — no usable firearms are allowed inside.

There are over 20 different training scenarios: De-escalation, Active Threat, and even Autism Awareness are just a few. Officers can improve decision-making and stress level control during intense situations, and trainees, who may be new to law enforcement, will be able to familiarize themselves with protocols in a safe, controlled setting.

TCSO's use of the VirTra system is meant to supplement existing training techniques, not to replace them. The different scenarios offered in the curriculum will continue to grow over time.

LAKE & BOATING SAFETY



Last summer, 10 people lost their lives on Lake Travis. We want you to enjoy the lake, but more importantly, we want you to be safe. Please remember to wear a life jacket when you're out on the water. In an emergency remember these tips:

- Throw a flotation device to distressed person
- Know where you are on the lake - Use maps & landmarks
- Don't assist anyone unless you're wearing a life jacket
- Alert boaters around you - Yell • Whistle • Horn

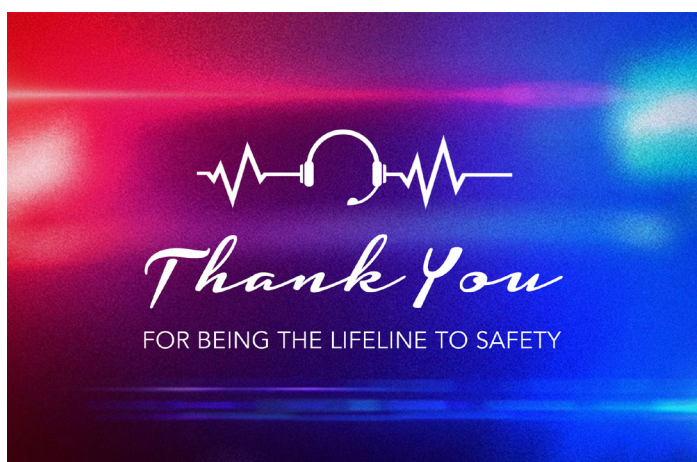


PUBLIC SAFETY CADET'S SUCCESS
