House Bill 33, also known as the Uvalde Strong Act, was passed into law and became effective September 1. The bill was proposed by State Rep. Don McLaughlin, the former Mayor of Uvalde, Texas.

The law is designed to improve school safety and emergency response to active-attack incidents on school campuses by addressing response plans, training, equipment, security plans and communication. Under the law, Texas sheriffs are required to conduct at least one meeting annually in which local, state and federal law enforcement agencies, ISD superintendents, first responders and emergency management representatives share information and develop standard

It hurts my heart that we live in a day and time in which evil acts of violence are enacted on school campuses. As hard as it is to consider, it is our duty to learn all we can and prepare to the very best of our ability. And we do. As an agency, TCSO has mandated and received Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALERRT) for years. This law is the next step in preparedness.

In November, I will host Travis County's first annual meeting. 
